

12. MISCELLANEOUS

A. EMPORIA-GREENSVILLE REGIONAL AIRPORT

The Emporia Greenville Regional Airport is located on Route 58 near the Greenville/Southampton County line with approximately 600 feet of the end of Runway 34 physically located in Southampton County. Runway 34 does not currently meet FAA Design standards as U.S. Route 58 on the southern boundary of airport property falls within the Runway Object Free Area (ROFA). The approved Airport Layout Plan (ALP) calls for the airport's ROFA to be brought into compliance with FAA design standards. The ALP determined that in order to meet the ROFA standards, the Runway 34 threshold would need to be "shifted" towards the northwest in order to avoid U.S. Route 58 and to ensure a clear 34:1 slope, non-precision approach surface. Accordingly they've prepared a complete Environmental Assessment (EA) and are asking for any public comments by September 5. Attached herewith please find an aerial photo that illustrates the proposed action. I have a full copy of the EA available in my office if anyone is interested.

B. SOUTHEAST RELIABILITY PIPELINE

I've invited representatives from Dominion Power to your September meeting (September 22) to provide us with a public briefing regarding their proposed Southeast Reliability Pipeline. I've attached some very basic information in case you're not familiar with the project.

C. FALL ECO-CRUISE WITH THE RIVERKEEPER

As I mentioned in my e-mail earlier this month, at the bottom of the thank-you note from the Riverkeeper was an invitation for the Board to participate in an Eco-Cruise sometime later this fall. Please come prepared to share with me some dates that you are available and I'll check with Jeff to see if any of them will work with his schedule.

D. REVENUE ANTICIPATION NOTE

I'm pleased to confirm that Revenue Anticipation Note approved by the Board last month closed without any issues on August 12 at 1.33%. We made an initial draw of \$1.5 million which should carry us for at least 30 days. Our cost for the first 29 days (through September 9) is \$1,609.14.

Please remember to support the Historical Society and attend Heritage Day on Saturday, September 13.



Dominion exploring construction of gas pipeline through Central Virginia

RICHMOND — Dominion Resources Inc. is considering building an approximately 450-mile-long natural gas transmission pipeline from West Virginia through Virginia to southern North Carolina that would go into service by the end of 2018.

The project is in the "extremely preliminary" stage, company spokesman Jim Norvelle said. "We have not decided to do this."

The new pipeline, called the Dominion Southeast Reliability Project, would extend from the natural-gas rich Marcellus and Utica shale production regions in the Appalachians to markets in Virginia and North Carolina, according to a statement from Thomas F. Farrell II, Dominion Resources' chairman, president, and CEO.

"We think there's interest in getting natural gas from the Appalachian Basin into Virginia and North Carolina," Norvelle said Tuesday.

Such a pipeline could cost as much as \$2 billion to build, based on current construction prices for large U.S. gas pipelines.

The pipeline would enter the state in Highland County in western Virginia and run in a southeasterly direction through Nelson, Buckingham, Dinwiddie and Brunswick counties where it turns southward toward North Carolina.

[REDACTED] and a short connection to the 1,358-megawatt, natural-gas fueled Brunswick Power Station near Lawrenceville in Brunswick County. In North Carolina, spurs would run to the Raleigh and Fayetteville areas.

According to the Dominion Resources' annual meeting presentation May 7, the recent, unusually cold winter highlighted need for southeastern gas infrastructure, with the proposed pipeline project giving customers access to additional supply basins.

Pipeline companies seeking to construct natural gas pipeline facilities must obtain approval from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Dominion Transmission issued what's termed a non-binding open-season notice for the project April 16.

FERC requires the open-season process to ensure that interested parties are made aware of new pipeline projects and to determine if there is sufficient customer interest to pursue projects.

Dominion Transmission has 7,800 miles of pipeline in six states: Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York. The company also operates one of the largest underground natural gas storage systems in the United States with links to other major pipelines and markets in the Midwest, Mid-Atlantic and Northeast regions.

Dominion Transmission stores and transports large quantities of natural gas for major customers, such as utilities and power plants. Dominion Transmission also is a producer and supplier of natural gas liquids at facilities in West Virginia and Maryland.

As a result of its extensive natural gas processing and pipeline system in the gas-rich Marcellus shale region underlying the Appalachian basin, Dominion Resources says it is well positioned to take advantage of the region's natural gas opportunities.

Environmentalists are concerned about the proposal's impacts.

"This cannot happen without long-term damage to the ecologic and hydrologic integrity of the Allegheny Highlands, among the best and least altered natural landscapes in the eastern U.S.," said Rick Webb, a senior scientist with the University of Virginia's Department of Environmental Science, "and it will add to the factors that are driving environmentally irresponsible gas drilling practices."

Shale gas refers to natural gas that is trapped within shale formations. Shales are fine-grained sedimentary rocks that can be rich sources of petroleum and natural gas.

Over the past decade, the combination of horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracturing has allowed access to large volumes of shale gas that were previously uneconomical to produce.

Production of natural gas from shale formations has rejuvenated the natural gas industry in the United States, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration.

Dear Mayor Kitchen:

This notice is to advise that you may be in violation of §12 VAC 5-590-370 of the Commonwealth of Virginia *Waterworks Regulations* for failure to complete required monitoring of the bacteriological quality of water your waterworks serves to consumers. The *Regulations* require your system to collect one routine water sample for bacteriological examination each month and report the results of the test to this office no later than the 10th day of the following month. According to our records no bacteriological sample was collected, analyzed or reported for the month of July 2014.

Required Actions

Public Notice: The *Waterworks Regulations* characterizes this as a situation that requires Tier 3 public notification. According to § 12 VAC 5-590-540, you are required to notify consumers that the prescribed monitoring was not performed, as follows:

- You must provide notice to consumers within one year of receipt of this letter.
- Your notice to customers must be mailed or directly delivered to each customer receiving a bill, and to other service connections served by your waterworks.
- If your waterworks serves consumers who do not pay water bills, or do not have service connection addresses (apartment dwellers, university students, or nursing home patients, for example), you must also use other delivery methods to provide notice to these consumers as well. Examples of other methods include (but are not limited to) publication in local newspapers, delivery of multiple copies to apartment buildings, or posting the notice in public places served by the system.
- You may choose to include your notice to consumers as an enclosure with your Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) for 2014. To do so, the combined CCR and public notice must be distributed to consumers by July 1, 2015 which is the deadline for distributing the CCR alone. Furthermore, you must take steps to ensure that the CCR and notice reaches all persons served by the waterworks. This requirement is more stringent than the "good faith effort" requirements for distributing the CCR alone.

Public Notice Confirmation: Within ten (10) days of completing public notification, you must provide this Office with a copy of the notice you distribute, along with signed certification of the distribution completion date and methods used. Failure to distribute public notice and report to the Virginia Department of Health may be a further violation of the *Waterworks Regulations*. A public notification completion form is enclosed for your use.

Follow-up Action: You must collect a routine bacteriological sample each month. We have received the August 2014 sample.

Enclosed please find Waterworks Operation Permit No. 3175035 with an effective date of August 1, 2014 issued by the Commonwealth of Virginia Department of Health, Office of Drinking Water. This permit is your authorization from the State Health Commissioner to operate the subject waterworks located in Southampton County in accordance with the *Waterworks Regulations*. This permit is not transferable. This permit does not suspend, minimize, or otherwise alter this owner's obligation to comply with applicable federal, state, or local laws and regulations or permits.

You will note that the permit indicates that this waterworks has a permitted capacity of 18,720 gpd. This limit is based on the maximum capacity of the system and shall not be exceeded.

A variance to the *Waterworks Regulations* is included for this waterworks. This variance to 12VAC5-590-520 of the *Waterworks Regulations* allows operation of the waterworks without metering of total water production subject to the conditions outlined in the variance.

The enclosed Waterworks Operation Permit specifies a maximum volume that this waterworks may produce, in terms of gallons per day. This capacity is based on public health requirements and the application of engineering principles. Please note that production is not to exceed the design capacity of any on-site wastewater disposal system issued by the local Health Department.

We look forward to your continued cooperation in the maintenance and operation of this public waterworks.

Dear Ms. Harper:

This notice is to advise that you may be in violation of §12 VAC 5-590-370 of the Commonwealth of Virginia *Waterworks Regulations*. Section 12 VAC 5-590-370 B.1.d.(3) requires the owner of a groundwater source waterworks with fewer than 150 service connections to take one cyanide sample at each sampling point during each compliance period beginning in the compliance period starting January 1, 1996. Our records indicate that a cyanide sample was required during the 2011-2013 sampling period and that no sample was collected.

Section 12 VAC 5-590-370D.1.a. of the Commonwealth of Virginia *Waterworks Regulations* requires all community waterworks to collect four quarterly radionuclide samples from each entry point into the distribution system during the initial monitoring period of 2004 to 2007, unless existing data are acceptable for substitution under the grandfather provision of the regulation. The April 2002 sample results indicated that your waterworks was eligible for the grandfathering provision of the new regulation. Those results were substituted for the initial monitoring requirement for the 2004 to 2007 period. We used those results to establish the monitoring frequency of future radionuclide samples. Your next required sample for radionuclides should have been collected from the entry point tap during the 2008-2013 compliance cycle. Subsequent samples should have been collected at the entry point tap every six years. Our records show that a radiological sample was required to be collected and analyzed during the 2008-2013 compliance cycle and that no sample was collected, analyzed or reported.

Required Actions

Public Notice: The *Waterworks Regulations* characterizes this as a situation that requires Tier 3 public notification. According to § 12 VAC 5-590-540, you are required to notify consumers that the prescribed monitoring was not performed, as follows:

- You must provide notice to consumers no later than one year following receipt of this notice.
- Your notice to customers must be mailed or directly delivered to each customer receiving a bill, and to other service connections served by your waterworks.

- Until the violation is resolved, you must give a copy of the notice to all new billing units or new customers, before or at the time service begins.
- You must repeat distribution of the notice annually, for as long as the violation persists.
- If you are using a private laboratory, you should advise them that the monthly samples are for compliance purposes and ask that they submit results directly to this office.

Draft Notice: Attached is a draft notice for you to provide to consumers. You may use this notice as is, or modify it to better meet your situation, as long as the information is accurate and the notice contains all of the required elements and mandated language. If you decide to change the notice, we suggest that you contact this Office to verify that your proposed changes meet the requirements of the *Waterworks Regulations*.

Public Notice Confirmation: Within ten (10) days of completing public notification, you must provide this Office with a copy of the notice you distribute, along with signed certification of the distribution completion date and methods used. Failure to distribute public notice and report to the Virginia Department of Health may be a further violation of the *Waterworks Regulations*. A public notification completion form is enclosed for your use.

Follow-up Actions: Radiological and cyanide samples are due now. You must collect the required samples from the entry point to the distribution system. You may contract with a *certified* private laboratory for these sample analyses however you will need to send a copy of the analysis results directly to this office. If you choose to use the State lab for these samples a solicitation will be sent to you.

I am writing in response to the Resolution (Resolution 0714-10) that you passed on July 28, 2014 regarding your support for comprehensive immigration reform. I agree with you that our nation's immigration system is broken and our current laws are not being enforced.

Like you, I remain opposed to any and all forms of amnesty including denying automatic citizenship at birth to children born to illegal immigrants. Our immigration policy must reflect our core belief that entry into the United States is not a right, but a privilege. The government must ensure the safety and security of our nation's borders. In order to do so, we must identify and monitor the constant flow of illegal immigrants coming into our country.

A workable system to track who has returned or illegally overstayed is grossly overdue. A biometric exit system remains an unfilled recommendation included in the report published by the 9/11 Commission nearly 10 years ago. The 9/11 Commission called it, "an essential investment in our national security." Ensuring that we have a proper entry and exit system in place is just common sense.

Further, in today's global economy, our nation needs access to the world's best talent to maintain our competitive edge. In order to grow the economy, we must ensure that business owners are able to hire additional employees, and that those coming to this country to find work are able to do it legally, through temporary guest worker programs, or on STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) visas.

However, we need to ensure that there are safeguards to protect American workers from being replaced by outside labor, and that jobs are only made available to those authorized to work in the United States.

While America is a nation of immigrants, our nation was also built on the foundation of the rule of law. In addition to the security implications that illegal immigration poses, allowing an unchecked

wave of illegal immigrants to come into the United States greatly undermines our current immigration policy and places an unfair burden on localities and taxpayers.

Thank you for taking the time to contact me on this issue. You can be assured that I will continue to support the rule of law, work to secure our borders and reform our broken immigration system.
