



This outstanding accomplishment is the direct result of dedicated, skilled teachers and incredible, hard working students working together to achieve success. ### **Going for Year Thirteen of Accreditation**

With twelve successful years under our belts, SHS is aggressively moving forward to provide opportunities for students to meet with success on SOL testing during the 2013-2014 school year. Classroom instruction, benchmarks, reviews, and remediation have been underway since the beginning of the year. During October, students enrolled in English 11 took the English 11 Writing SOL tests. Teachers and students are now doing all that is necessary to achieve success on first semester end of course SOL tests which are scheduled to be given January 14 - January 22.

### **SHS Receives \$4,000 Dominion Power Grant**

Dominion Power has given Southampton High science classes a grant for \$4,000. The grant funds will be utilized by three science teachers: Mr. Overstreet, Mr. Lilley, and Mrs. Matthews to buy equipment to convert cellulosic

biomass sources into sugars and ethanol. Funds will also be used to purchase equipment so that students can build and compare wind propellers and determine how much electricity they produce. SHS is extremely appreciative to Dominion Power for their generous gift which will give students the opportunity to gain critical thinking skills in the area of alternative fuels and give them hand-on experience in scientific investigation.




### **Parent Online Access to Grades**




## SHS Students Doing Extraordinary Things

## Varsity Volleyball Third Year District Winners

The Southampton Lady Indians finished the regular season with a record of Twenty wins and only three losses finishing in first place in the district for the third year. It was also the third year in a row that the ladies finished undefeated in the district. This year's 16-0 record in the district marked the first year in the newly expanded Tri-rivers District.



We are in receipt of the lead and copper "first draw" tap sample results for the subject public waterworks located in Southampton County. These results were submitted in accordance with Lead and Copper Rule monitoring requirements of the Virginia *Waterworks Regulations* for the July through December 2013 monitoring period. A total of twenty sample results were received.

With these results, your waterworks has now completed the second of two Follow-up rounds of monitoring as defined in the Regulations. The results of the most recent monitoring events are summarized in the table below.

### Southampton Correctional Complex Waterworks: Lead & Copper Results

Having the monitoring results for two consecutive 6-month periods with 90<sup>th</sup> percentile concentrations of  $\leq 0.005$  mg/L and  $\leq 0.65$  mg/L for lead and copper respectively, your system can proceed to reduced monitoring (1 year intervals). Your next required monitoring will be to collect 10 samples during the June 1 – September 30, 2014 monitoring period.

Please note that all lead and copper "first draw" tap samples must be collected from the same sampling locations that were used during previous monitoring periods and are approved site locations. If you find it

necessary to change any tap sample location, the new location should be of the same tier and category as the initial location and written justification must be submitted to this office.

The EPA's Lead and Copper rule (Federal Register 40 CFR 141.85) indicates that you are now required to notify the occupants of each building that was sampled of the lead and copper results for that building. In addition, you must provide an explanation of the health effects of lead, list steps consumers can take to reduce exposure to lead in drinking water, and water utility contact information. The notification must also provide the maximum contaminant level goal, the action level for lead, and the definitions for these two terms.

Notification to the consumers must be made by posting in public areas as soon as practical but no later than 30 days from the date of this letter. To assist you in meeting this new notification requirement, enclosed is a sample results notification letter and a fact sheet that meets the EPA mandatory requirements. After notification has been completed, you must complete the enclosed "Lead and Copper Results Delivery Certification" form and return it to us along with a sample of the consumer notification. The Certification form and sample copy of the consumer notification must be submitted to us within 3 months from the end of the monitoring period or no later than March 31, 2014.

As the lead Action Level has previously been exceeded, you may still be required to install and operate optimum corrosion control treatment. If, however, further monitoring indicates levels are remaining predictably below the Action Level, this requirement may be rescinded.

If you find it necessary to change any tap sample location, the new location should be of the same tier and category as the initial location and written justification for the change must be submitted to this office.

This office remains available to provide assistance to you in complying with the above listed requirements of the Lead and Copper Rule. Should you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact this office.



#### **Re: Failure to Collect Required Bacteriological Sample**

Dear Ms. Harper:

This notice is to advise that you may be in violation of §12 VAC 5-590-370 of the Commonwealth of Virginia *Waterworks Regulations* for failure to complete required monitoring of the bacteriological quality of water your waterworks serves to consumers. The *Regulations* require your system to collect one routine water sample for bacteriological examination each month and report the results of the test to this office no later than the 10<sup>th</sup> day of the following month. According to our records no bacteriological sample was collected, analyzed or reported for the month of September 2013.

#### **Required Actions**

**Public Notice:** The *Waterworks Regulations* characterizes this as a situation that requires Tier 3 public notification. According to § 12 VAC 5-590-540, you are required to notify consumers that the prescribed monitoring was not performed, as follows:


